A meeting was held in the Church Room on Monday the 27th May, to make arrangements for the Bazaar in the autumn. It was finally settled that the Bazaar should be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 1st and 2nd in the Albert Hall. A general Committee was formed, and also Side Show and Advertising Committees. The Ladies' Committee was already in existence.

There seems to be some misunderstanding about the Cards that are issued. They are simply Cards for savings. If any one pays in five shillings, for example, he can spend that five shillings in any way he likes, at the Stalls, at the Side Show or for entrance: the only restriction is that it must be spent at the Bazaar. The money will be returned to those who pay in, in the form of tickets, each of the value of sixpence: so that the payer in of five shillings, will receive ten sixpenny tickets, which will pass as money. There are a good many out: it is an excellent way of supporting the Bazaar, and helping the Church Room, and getting your money's worth back again.

A very good entertainment was given in the Church Room on Thursday 16th May by the troupe of Christy Minstrels from Barnstaple. The attendance was unfortunately very poor. The nett proceeds were £1 4s. 4d, which will be given to the Church Room.

THE CHURCHWARDENS' CHURCHYARD FUND.

On referring to the Churchwardens' accounts, which are here published, it will be found that there is an adverse balance of £16 18s. 10d. Although the receipts from the offertories are considerably larger than they have been in former years, yet the expenses tend to regularly increase, and it will be readily seen on looking at the accounts that these cannot be expected to be less in any future year, and this year they will probably be more, as the Church will have to be re-coloured throughout, and there are other extra expenses that will have to be met.

In view of this, and considering the fact that the Churchyard cannot be kept in the condition that they would like to see it out of the ordinary expenses of the Church, the Churchwardens have started a special Churchyard Fund, for which they solicit small annual subscriptions from all those who are interested in our Church and its surroundings. Sums of 10s. and 5s. per annum have been promised, but they hope to receive many smaller subscriptions of 2s. 6d. and 1s. from those who have relatives buried in the Churchyard and from the parishioners generally. Such subscriptions may be sent to either of the Churchwardens, and the Vicar will gladly receive any subscription, however small. In case of any misapprehension the Churchwardens would like it to be understood that they do not wish to interfere with anyone keeping their own family graves or tombs in order, or, if they so desire, paying anyone to do so; they only wish to keep the grass cut, the paths in order, and the Churchyard generally neat and tidy.
